Results of the Historic Designation Committee Funding Vote at the August 21 CPNO Meeting


Mulberry Fields Gone Wylde!

Cuban Mojo Chicken Thighs

I recently tried this recipe from What's Gaby Cooking and I was hooked. It's so easy, perfect for summer, and full of flavor. If you have time I suggest marinating the chicken over night. This marinade would also be excellent on pork and seafood.

INGREDIENTS

- 6 cloves of garlic
- 1 medium shallot, roughly chopped
- 2 tsp kosher salt
- 11/2 tsp ground cumin
- 1 tsp dried oregano
- 1/2 tsp freshly ground black pepper
- zest of 1 lime
- 1/3 cup freshly squeezed lime juice
- 1/2 cup orange juice
- 1/3 extra virgin olive oil
- 3 lbs boneless, skinless chicken thighs

INSTRUCTIONS

In a blender, combine all the marinade ingredients and blend until smooth. Pour ½ cup of marinade into a small bowl and reserve it for the dipping sauce. Toss the chicken with the remaining marinade. Marinate in the fridge for at least an hour or overnight.

Prepare a grill for medium high heat, and lightly oil the grill grates. Grill the chicken for approximately 10-15 minutes (or until the internal temperature reaches at least 165°F for thighs and 150°F to 155°F for breasts), turning every 5-7 minutes.

Transfer the reserved sauce to a non-stick skillet and reduce over medium high heat for 3-5 minutes until thickened. Drizzle over the grilled chicken and serve.



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Why Is Candler Park "Significant" Anyway?

A Brief Developmental History

This is an updated version of an article that appeared in the September 2017 Candler Park Messenger.

Historic significance has to do with the ability of a place today to tell us about the past. As Doug Young, Director of Atlanta's Office of Design puts it, many properties and districts in Atlanta are significant because they represent a key piece of Atlanta's developmental history, they tell a story. Visually, they have changed little enough over time that they are "snapshots in time" of a period or perhaps several periods. Candler Park is one of those awesome places where its history, a piece of Atlanta's story, can be read just by walking down the street.

Most of what we see in Candler Park today is an excellent example of an early 20th century streetcar suburb. However, as most of you know, the neighborhood's developmental history begins a few decades earlier as the community of Edgewood, a railroad suburb that grew up along the railroad in the 1870s and was incorporated as a town in 1899.

From Railroad to Streetcar Suburb

As a railroad suburb, Edgewood was oriented to the Georgia Railroad stop at "Mayson's Crossing" where Candler Park Drive (originally Mayson Avenue) once crossed the railroad, and today the site of the MARTA office building. The town extended north and south of the tracks. On the north side development was along DeKalb and on streets at the center of Candler Park today including Mell, Candler Park Drive, and Oakdale. The new town had about 1300 residents, both black and white, from a wide variety of occupations including businessmen, professionals, tradespersons, laborers and even those outlying farmers. By 1907, the lack of paved streets, sidewalks, sewers, water and gas lines were beginning to wear on residents and in 1909 Edgewood was annexed into the City of Atlanta. Immediate improvements were made which gave developers the incentive they needed to sell lots and houses oriented around the two streetcar lines—along DeKalb and along McLendon to Clifton.

In cities across the United States the introduction of the streetcar between 1890 and 1920 extended the opportunity for home ownership in suburban neighborhoods to middle- and working-class households. Because streetcars made numerous stops spaced at short intervals developers platted rectilinear subdivisions where homes, generally on small lots, were built within a five- or 10-minute walk of the streetcar, creating a much more continuous development pattern than the "node" development of earlier railroad suburbs. In the former town of Edgewood this resulted in infill residential growth east and west of Mayson's Crossing.

Additionally, neighborhood-oriented commercial facilities, such as grocery stores, bakeries, and drugstores were clustered at the intersections of streetcar lines or along the more heavily traveled routes. The commercial buildings we frequent today at the intersections of McLendon with Oakdale and Clifton sprang into being in the 1910s and 20s. Similar brick commercial buildings were also built on DeKalb primarily where MARTA is today.

Across the country, streetcar subdivisions coincided with the popularity of the Craftsman Bungalow, a modest, low-cost house, which was well-suited to the narrow lots of streetcar-oriented plats. Candler Park was platted by numerous individual developers and expanded in increments as adjoining parcels of land were subdivided and the existing grid of streets extended. Because Atlanta was in a period of intense growth, these subdivisions were rapidly platted and developed over a very short period of time which resulted in streetscapes that are very similar and compatible with one another while not being completely

homogenous. Candler Park as we know it today was almost completely developed by 1930 and little new construction occurred until the 1940s when the post-World War II building boom kicked in.

Post-WWII development

Post World War II development is also an important part of Candler Park's story and definitely important in the larger story of Atlanta. Despite the growth of suburbs outside of the city during this housing boom, there was also housing demand within the city limits. In Candler Park, new "American Small Houses" and a ranch house or two were constructed on undeveloped land at the north side of the neighborhood. Some post-World War II housing likely also replaced earlier homes of the African American community which had a quickly-decreasing presence in the neighborhood at this time.

Finally, in the late 1950s and 60s, a few large lots remaining in the neighborhood, sites of rather grand Victorian homes located on the outer reaches of the former town of Edgewood, were developed as apartment complexes. Changes to apartment zoning regulations in 1965, however, appear to have pretty much halted this type of apartment building construction throughout the City.

Other parts of Candler Park's story that can be read in our streetscapes include a small handful homes and the Old Stone Church, a testament to the early African American community here, and the newer houses around Freedom Park which are a reminder of the plans for a highway and the "freeway revolts" that stopped it.

Glimpses into our Edgewood past can still be seen despite the march of bungalows. Some of the oldest houses in Candler Park can be found at the center of the neighborhood near the old "Mayson's Crossing" and up Oakdale. Some are the elaborate homes of illustrious Edgewood citizens while others are plain gabled or pyramidal-roofed cottages, modest, late-Victorian dwellings in a "delightful suburb."




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Don't Be Fooled Claims (a) b) (£

Food labels at the grocery store can be difficult to understand. Many products make big promises that often turn out to hide that they are glorified junk food. Customer demand for nutritious products has caused companies to label their foods in new and increasingly confusing ways. Not every meal we eat will only be fresh vegetables, fruits, meats, and other whole foods. Processed foods can be a small part of your diet, but the labeling is intentionally confusing. Fortunately, there are ways to see through the clutter and identify foods that support your health.

The first tip is to try to ignore the front of the package claims. Statements such as "made with whole grains" or "made with real fruit!" are often hiding the fact that the first few ingredients are sugar or corn syrup. Gluten-free or paleo labels are helpful for those with certain food sensitivities or dietary restrictions but do not guarantee the product is healthy. A paleo or gluten-free cookie is still a cookie and likely has a ton of sugar and chemicals and still should be treated as a rare dessert.

The key to understanding the food you eat is to read the ingredient list. The goal is to recognize the items listed. Ingredients are listed in descending order by weight, so the first few items will comprise the bulk of the product. If the item starts with sugar, high-fructose corn syrup, or some chemical you don't recognize, the product is not healthy. Ideally, the product will only have items that you understand and could otherwise buy in the store individually. Processed foods often have many preservatives packed into them that keep them stable and fresh on the shelf for months. While this may be convenient, those chemicals can be difficult for your body to process.

One sneaky trick to look out for is the serving size. Some items will claim that the item is two or four or even eight servings when in reality you are going to eat the whole thing at once. The claims of low calories or healthy snacks may not be valid if you are only supposed to nibble the edge. Also, if you are sensitive to salt or limiting sugars, the low value on the label can be misleading if you don't account for the additional servings.

Sugar makes its way into processed foods in all sorts of ways. New forms of sweeteners are being created all of the time to avoid being labeled as sugar or not showing a calorie count. Naturally occurring sugars found in fruit or honey are quite different from added sugars like corn syrup and sucralose. But they are still sugar nonetheless. Sugar alcohols are still just sugars even if they don't emit heat when burned and therefore are considered zero calories.

The artificial sweeteners are actually significantly sweeter to your tongue than sugar, by 200 to 20,000 times! Your body will therefore crave that sugary sweetness leading you to want more processed foods that are not delivering the best set of nutrients.

When buying processed foods, it is worth the effort to take a minute and read the ingredients and understand what is actually in the product you are buying. Unfortunately, the claims on the front can't be easily trusted. By taking a few seconds and having a plan, you can make choices that serve your health needs. Note that the top foods are ones that don't have a box or a label and these types of foods serve you the best.
