Atlanta Citizen Advocacy Inc. - Here in Candler Park

The Atlanta Citizen Advocacy Inc.

(ACA) provides protection and advocacy to people who have developmental disabilities by initiating and supporting one-to-one relationships between a volunteer advocate (citizen advocate) and a person who has a developmental disability. The agency provides orientation, training and support to the citizen advocates, so they can be as effective as possible.

Over 1000 Atlantans have learned about the value of advocacy and inclusion through ACA. Since 1991, ACA has initiated 100 advocacy matches, and currently supports 42 active relationships. Advocates are involved in activities such as negotiating to get a 17 year-old out of an institution and back to his family and community, helping keep partners from becoming institutionalized, supporting partners' independence by managing her/his money, or helping ensure partners receive the education they need to prepare them for adult and independent life.
